On March 17th the Ramblers, by the kind invitation of Mr. and Mrs. Keightley (owners of the property), will visit 17, Church Street. Mr. Keightley has title deeds of this house dating back to 1724, and the previous tenant said that he had seen deeds that went back to the reign of Charles II. One and a half of the original windows of the house are similar to those in that part of Holyrood which was built by Charles II. When the house first came into Mr. Keightley's possession, he stripped off seven wall papers and a layer of canvas, and all the present lovely old panelling was revealed. But we must leave the dis-covery of other interesting things in this old-time London house to "the Ramblers," except to say that, as William III once slept in a house near by, we may take it that this group of houses belonged to courtiers of his time. From Church Street we will go on to Leighton House, and Sir Alfred Rice-Oxley, J.P., has very kindly promised to show us the beauties of this wonderful building and its great art treasures. If time permits, there are other places of interest in the Royal Borough to be visited.
