The Alaunia patiently awaiting us on the quay, looked very spic and span, and quite a delightful place in which to spend a breezy time in search of pastures new. As in the case of Miss Breav on the Ascania, Miss Lloyd-Still was allotted magnificent quarters all "on her lone," bed sitting-room, containing a real wardrobe, with bathroom attached, all complete, and when we peeped in it was gay with flowers, and looked most alluring, Sisters flitting in and out putting the finishing touches. We were requested to be on the boat deck at 11.45, and there several photographs were taken to celebrate the occasion.

Mr. Cunard then invited the guests of those going to Montreal who had come to see them off to take luncheon with him in the really palatial restaurant, and very much we enjoyed his hospitality. Later we made a tour of the boat and found accommodation far ahead of the time when we paid double for crossing the

Atlantic a good many years ago.

Time was up at 2 p.m., so with many handshakes and good wishes we bid our colleagues good-bye, went ashore and waved a final farewell from the quay as the Alaunia moved steadily and slowly out to sea on her voyage to splendid Canada. A great moment!

Rundle, and many Public Health nurses and hospital Sisters, the majority for the first time taking part in the work of the world-wide International Council of Nurses founded in London on that auspicious July day in the year 1899.

Thirty years! And what marvellous progress.

We returned to London full of thankfulness for the devoted services of nurses all over the world who had made the "International" the power and blessing it has now become.
