THE PASSING BELL.

It is with deep regret we have to announce the death of Miss C. H. Keer, R.R.C., late Matron-in-Chief, Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service, who passed away suddenly at her home at West Worthing on 29th December, 1928. Miss Keer, the daughter of an English officer who went to live in Canada, was trained at the City Hospital, Massachusetts.

She joined the Army Nursing Service in December, 1887, at Netley, and a year later started on a five years' tour of duty in Egypt. On returning to England in April, 1894, she was posted to Dover, and at the beginning of the South African War was one of the first to be sent out, and did not return home until August, 1902.

on the re-organisation of the Army Nursing Service, and formation of Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service, Miss Keer was appointed Principal Matron in South Africa, and in April, 1906, succeeded Dame Sidney Browne as Matron-in-Chief at the War Office. Her appointment witnessed further developments in Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service, as well as important changes in the Military Families Hospitals. In the latter the position of the Nursing Staff was improved, and their pay and allowances increased.

Miss Keer was awarded the Queen's and King's South African Medals, and was also mentioned in Despatches. The R.R.C. was conferred upon her in 1902 for her work in this campaign.

We much regret to record the death at Glasgow, on December 24th, of Miss Janet Creelman Melrose, R.R.C., for fifteen years Matron of the Royal Infirmary, Glasgow, in which institution she received her training and where her professional life was spent. She was Assistant Matron when Mrs. Strong was Matron, and on the retirement of the latter was appointed Matron. During her tenure of office, the Royal Infirmary was largely rebuilt, involving very strenuous work on the part of the Matron. Miss Melrose was also a Principal Matron in the Territorial Force Nursing Service, and on the outbreak of war in 1914, in addition to her other duties, was called upon to organise and supervise two large general hospitals of the T.F.N.S., which she visited daily.

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
