The data of the International Congress on Tuberculosis held in Rome in 1928 have been collected, and I have received from Miss Hope Bell, China, a small pamphlet on the National Association in China.

I shall be grateful for any help in obtaining knowledge of Pioneer Nurses and Nursing History.

The President stated that Miss Bushby's report conveyed nothing of the time and work she had already expended in inaugurating the new History of Nursing Section, the result of which work would be invaluable to future generations of Nurses.

The President reported a grant of £10 towards initial expenses of the History of Nursing Section and invited gifts in support of it.

Social Schemes Committee Report.

Miss Isabel Macdonald, Chairman of the Social Schemes Committee, presented a short report of the first Ramble organised by the College to the grave of Florence Nightingale at East Wellow in Hampshire. The route led through Staines, Egham, Sunningdale, Camberley, Blackwater Heath, Hartley Row, Basingstoke, Winchester, Hursley, Romsey, East Wellow.

The owner, Mr. J. J. Crosfield, of Embley Park—a home of Miss Nightingale—most courteously welcomed the party, and permitted them to view the gardens and house.

The Report stated that "Reference should be made to the great kindness of Miss Cecilia Liddiatt, F.B.C.N., who undertook the whole of the arrangements...in no small measure the success of the Ramble is due to her efforts; Miss Liddiatt procured the charabanc, at a reduced charge, and each rambler only paid 8/6 the net cost of her seat." The Council passed a hearty vote of thanks to Miss Liddiatt for all the trouble she had taken to secure the success of the expedition which the Secretary was asked to convey to her.
