These cases, both in the first and second classes, could be augmented from the personal experience of Fellows of the British College of Nurses.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The following Recommendations are respectfully sub-

- 1. That protective legislation should be enacted empowering suitable authorities to keep sufferers from the after effects of encephalitis lethargica under observation and control, and to provide, if desirable, care in institutions, or in special colonies for cases of this nature, whatever the age of the sufferer.
- 2. That steps should be taken to secure an amendment to Section I (2) of the Mental Deficiency Act, 1927, by the deletion of the words "existing before the age of eighteen years" so that the Section may apply to "mental defectiveness" at whatever age it may first develop.
- 3. That if a medical certificate is furnished to the police that a person who is charged with a criminal offence is suffering from the after effects of encephalitis lethargica, he shall not be detained in custody, or brought to trial in a criminal court, but shall be regarded, and cared for, as a sick person, and shall be dealt with in special courts to be constituted for this purpose. Should it transpire in the course of a trial in the ordinary courts that the accused has suffered from encephalitis lethargica, then he shall be dealt with as a sick person, and not as a criminal.

At present the law allows of no distinction between these pitiable cases, in which the delinquents are not responsible for their actions, and common criminals; and the Council of the British College of Nurses regards it as a reproach to our social system that such a distinction cannot be made by judges and magistrates under existing laws.

The Statement was approved, and the Secretary was directed to forward it to the Secretary of State for Home Affairs.
