A reception was held at the College on Friday, April 11th, when twenty-two Matrons and Nurses from Holland were invited by the President and Council to meet Fellows and Members of the College. I am warmly in sympathy with the fundamental principles upon which the British College of Nurses is founded, and should I be fortunate enough to be appointed its Secretary I will use all the energy at my command in promoting its interests.
