## PRIZE GIVING AT THE QUEEN'S HOSPITAL, BIRMINGHAM.

Purslow presented medals and prizes to the nurses who had won them in 1928 and 1929. There was no distribution in 1928 owing to an influenza epidemic. 1929.—Hospital final examination: Nurse McArthur, gold medal; Nurse Price Jones, silver medal.

1929.—State examination.—Finals: Nineteen entered, sixteen passed. Three re-entries passed at the second attempt.
