actual purpose, that of exterminating the quack physician. The barbers had no share in it as first granted, but some years after Lowe's death some sort of combination with them appears to have been effected; so history repeats itself and our minds revert to Rule 9.1.g. of infamous memory. The barber surgeons were finally displaced in 1719 and in 1722 procured a municipal incorporation for themselves. It is notable that this Charter practically makes Dr. Peter Lowe and Dr. Robert Hamiltone the first Medical Officers of Health in Scotland, and also one might say that, in a sense, it made them the first Fiscals. Lowe himself never took any high official position in the Faculty, but there is abundant evidence that he was its moving spirit while he lived. Valiantly he carried his gospel into his time, and if you would look for some fruits of the life of Maister Peter Lowe, then turn your eyes northwards to the Universities and Medical Schools of Scotland, to the learned Medical Societies and Colleges there. He it was who, with the Charter of the Faculty for his Standard, inaugurated the long campaign in Scotland for the advancement of medicine. If, during his lifetime and for a century after, his name suffered from the jealousy of smaller minds and from the bitterness of those whom he had so ruthlessly condemned, we have to remember that the seeds of real progress are always sown by individuals who are ahead of their time and that the reaping, almost always, is delayed for a century or so after their death; doubtless if the great doctor could but look upon the medical profession as it is to-day he would say that the seeds that were of his sowing in the land of his birth had borne "luscious fruit" indeed. To the ages belongs the harvest.

THE PASSING BELL.

Many hundreds of nurses and midwives prepared at the General Lying-in Hospital, York Road, Lambeth, S.E., for the Examination of the Central Midwives Board, and who were privileged to be trained by Miss Marion Olive Haydon (Sister Olive) will be grieved to learn of her sudden death, on October 28th at 33, Ruskin Walk, Herne Hill. Miss Haydon was a most inspiring teacher, an experienced and clever midwife and was at one time a member of the Central Midwives Board, where her experienced judgment was of great value.

She was one of a family of seven sisters, all of whom were keen suffragists.

Throughout the Lying-in-State, in the Chapel of Our Lady Undercroft in Canterbury Cathedral, of Dr. Whitehead Reid ("the flying doctor" who succumbed to injuries he received when his monoplane crashed in the mist), there have been always two nurses from the Kent and Canterbury Hospital-immobile figures with hands clasped-acting as watchers in half-hour relays. At each corner of the bier were bowls of scarlet and pink roses and single roses were scattered on the stone floor. Dr. Reid was much respected and beloved and is sincerely mourned.

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
