NURSES' ORGANISATIONS.

THE NIGHTINGALE FELLOWSHIP,

A large and representative audience assembled in the Governors' Hall at St. Thomas's Hospital on Friday, December 5th, to listen to the Address given by Mrs. Bedford Fenwick on "The Formation and History of the International Council of Nurses and its value to the Nursing Profession."

Miss A. Lloyd Still, President of the Nightingale Fellow-

ship, was in the chair.

Mrs. Fenwick opened her Address by stating that the Council had been founded 3r years ago in London, and that it was the first time she had been asked to speak on the subject by an organisation of nurses in England. Mrs. Fenwick, carefully rendering "to Cæsar the things that are Cæsar's," spoke of the discovery of America by Christobal Colon (Columbia) in 1492, the commemorative Columbian Exposition and Congress at Chicago in 1893, her meeting with Miss Lavinia Dock and Mrs. May Wright Sewall, the High Priestess of the International Idea, and her own proposal in 1899, seconded by Miss Isla Stewart, to found the International Council of Nurses which now encircles the World by the affiliation of twenty-three National Councils of Nurses. The Address is to be fully reported in the official organ of the Nightingale Fellowship.

THE LEAGUE OF ST. BARTHOLOMEW'S HOSPITAL NURSES.

There was a large and cheery gathering at the League of St. Bartholomew's Hospital Nurses Winter Meeting which was held in the Nurses' Quarters on the 6th inst.

It had been decided earlier in the year that the League would endeavour to raise a sufficient sum of money to

endow a bed in the new Surgical Block.

With this object in view, there was a goodly collection of articles suitable for Christmas gifts on sale. The one hundred and eighteenth meeting of the General Nursing Council for England and Wales was held at 20, Portland Place, London, W.I., on November 28th, the Chairman, Miss E. M. Musson, C.B.E., R.R.C., presiding.

Finance.

On the recommendation of the Finance Committee, Bills and Claims submitted for payment were approved, and the sum of £200 for postage stamps, £10 for Insurance stamps, and £5 for Petty Cash were allowed.

is becoming too bulky to bind in one volume.

That the estimate of Butler and Tanner, Ltd., for printing 250 copies of the Register of Nurses for 1931 in two volumes,

amounting to £1,654 be accepted.

That the offices be closed from the evening of Tuesday, 23rd December until Monday morning, 29th December, for the Christmas Holiday.

Registration.

The applications of eight Registered Nurses for duplicate Silver Badges, in place of those of which the loss was reported a year ago, were granted upon their fulfilling the necessary conditions.

The Registration Committee presented for approval fourteen applications for admission to the General Part of the Register by Reciprocity, eleven applications for admission to the Supplementary Part of the Register for Fever Nurses by Examination and two by Reciprocity, and one to the Supplementary Part of the Register for Mental Nurses by Reciprocity. These were approved.

It was agreed to re-insert in the Register the names of thirty-three nurses who had hitherto failed to pay their retention fees and now wished their names to be reincluded.

Education and Examination.
