CONFERENCE BETWEEN THE CEN-TRAL MIDWIVES' BOARD AND LOCAL SUPERVISING AUTHORITIES.

The Central Midwives Board proposes to convene a conference between members of the Board and representatives of local supervising authorities on March 4th, 1931, on matters connected with the administration of the Midwives Acts.

Matters proposed to be discussed at the conference comprise: --- (i) matters arising out of the revision of the Board's rules in section E; (ii) the question of the transfer to the local supervising authorities of the powers of conducting penal pro-ceedings before the Board ; (iii) the question of the provision of better facilities for post-certificate training; (iv) the ques-tion of what steps can be taken to provide for post - examination experience of pupil mid-wives prior to certifica-tion; (v) the qualifications of inspectors of midwives; and (vi) the

The Registrar-General's quarterly return, just issued, shows that the birth-rate in the third quarter of the present year was 16.5 per 1,000, which is 0.1 more than the rate for the same period of last year. The death-rate was 9.6 per 1,000, which is 0.1 below that of 1929.

The infant mortality rate is 45 per 1,000 live births.
