Miss Haldane therefore formally put to the vote the election of Miss Musson as Chairman of the Council for the ensuing year and declared her duly elected.

She thought it must be satisfactory to Miss Musson that all were agreed, and on behalf of the Council wished her a

useful and pleasant term of office.

Miss Musson then resumed the chair, and thanked the Council for their renewed interest. She sometimes thought it would be advisable for a younger member of the Council to be appointed Chairman, but she would do her best to serve it during the ensuing year.

## Election of Vice-Chairman.

The Registrar reported that 17 nominations had been received for Miss Cox-Davies for the position of Vice-Chairman. No other nominations had been received and Miss Musson formally put to the vote the election of Miss Cox-Davies as Vice-Chairman of the Council for the ensuing year and declared her duly elected.

Miss Cox-Davies briefly returned thanks for her re-election.

#### Finance.

On the recommendation of the Finance Committee, the bills and claims submitted for payment were approved, and the sum of £100 for stamps and £10 for insurance stamps allowed.

The Chairman of the Council and the Chairman of the Finance Committee were authorised to invest the sum of £7,500 after consultation with the Council's bankers. Estimates for 10,000 flex folders, at 23s. per hundred, and 20,000 Manila bag-shaped envelopes, at 27s. 6d. per 1,000, were accepted.

### Registration.

On the recommendation of the Registration Committee, it was agreed to accept for registration by reciprocity:—

- (1) Nurses trained for a period of not less than three years in a \*General Hospital in the Presidency of Madras and registered by Examination on Part I. of the Register of Nurses of the Nurses' and Midwives' Council of Madras, under Section 5 (1) of the Madras Nurses' and Midwives' Act, 1926, as defined in By-law 2 (i.).
- (2) Nurses trained in England and Wales in a \*General Hospital approved by the General Nursing Council for England and Wales, and registered on the Register of Nurses of the Nurses' and Midwives' Council of Madras.

\*Note.—A General Hospital is defined as one which admits men, women and children, and gives instruction in the four main services—Medical, Surgical, Gynæcological and Children's Diseases. Such general training may be given in one General Hospital recognised as a complete training school, or in recognised affiliated or associated hospitals which together give instruction in the abovenamed services.

It was agreed that Silver Badges (marked "Duplicate") be issued to three Registered Nurses on payment by them of the price of the badge and the additional expense of engraving the word "Duplicate."

Three applications for admission to the General Part of the Register, by reciprocity, and six for admission to the Supplementary Part of the Register by examination, were approved.

It was agreed to re-include in the Register the names of twenty-five nurses who had hitherto failed to pay their Retention Fee and now desired that they should be reincluded.

The Council also directed that the names of 1,841 nurses who had not paid their Retention Fees for 1930 should be removed from the Register.

The Registration Committee reported that the number of nurses registered during 1929 was as follows:—
