HONORARIA FOR MEMBERS OF COUNCIL.

It was agreed unanimously to place on the Agenda of the Annual Meeting in July a Resolution to substitute the sum of £75 instead of £100 as Honoraria for members of the Council, and £100 instead of £150 for Vice-Presidents, to date from the next election. No alterations in the Honoraria to be retrospective.

The President explained that the Honoraria were given for expert services, for personal expenses, and for supporting the amenities of the College, and it had been found that £75 would meet such needs. It had been pointed out that with the surplus, which would amount in time to £300 per annum, much could be done for the benefit of Fellows and Members in subsidising education, travel, and in other respects.
