The salary, however, is of small importance compared with superannuation.

We are profoundly convinced that the passing of this Bill would destroy the spirit of service in our hospitals by making nursing a means of livelihood, and not, as it should be, the most vocational of professions.

We would, therefore, most earnestly urge upon you the necessity of opposing this Bill, in order to preserve a system of nursing which is the pride of our country and the envy of the civilised world.

## GENERAL NURSING COUNCIL FOR ENGLAND AND WALES.

The one hundred and twenty-third meeting of the General Nursing Council for England and Wales was held on Friday, April 24th, at 20, Portland Place, London, W. Miss E. M. Musson, Chairman of the Council, presided.

## Correspondence.

Apologies for absence were sent by Miss Lloyd Still and Miss Hogg.

## Finance.

The Finance Committee recommended that the Bills and Claims submitted for payment be approved, and that the sum of  $\pounds 25$  for Postage Stamps,  $\pounds 20$  for Insurance Stamps, and  $\pounds 15$  for Petty Cash be allowed. It raised no objections to Recommendations 12, 13, 14 and 15, and sanctioned which were that a uniform suit be purchased for the Caretaker at a cost of  $f_{6}6$  6s., that the Gestetner Duplicating Machine, which was purchased in 1921, be fitted with new cylinders at a cost of £5 5s., that the estimate of Messrs. B. Colley and Sons, for repairs, cleaning, and painting for the year 1931 amounting to  $\pounds$ 155 be accepted, also an additional sum of  $\pounds$ 1 ros. 8d. for fixing shelves in the cupboard in the hall.

Dr. Fawcett, who presented the Report of the Finance Committee, also reported that they had sanctioned a fifth recommendation of the General Purposes Committee which the Chairman of that Committee would move, for the expenditure of £126 115. for repairs in rooms in the base-ment and the upper floor. The Chairman of the Council, of the Finance and General Purposes Committees, and the Architect had together inspected these premises and the work was essential and urgently needed.

The Committee further reported that in accordance with authority granted by the Council Meeting on March 27th the sum of £2,000 had been invested in Derby Corporation 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> per cent. Stock, 1951-61, at a cost of £1,956 6s. 5d. The Committee recommended that the estimate of John

N. Dawson for supplying 750 gusset envelopes for the Examinations Department amount to f6 ros. be accepted.

## **Registration.**

The Registration Committee reported applications from two Registered Nurses for duplicate Silver Badges, the loss of which was reported a year ago. Granted.

Applications for approval for registration were :--For the General Register by reciprocity, 6; for the Supple-mentary Part of the Register for Fever Nurses, 10 by examination, and by reciprocity, I. The Registration Committee recommended that the

applications be approved for Registration.

The Council approved the reinclusion in the Register of the names of fifty nurses who had hitherto failed to pay their Retention Fee and now wished their names reincluded.

## Education and Examination.

The Education and Examination Committee reported that they had considered applications from the authorities of hospitals for approval as Training Schools, and made recommendations :-

"That the following Hospital be provisionally approved as a training school which in combination with another public hospital gives complete training under Section I. (1) (b) of the Council's Scheme of Training, for a period of one year from April 24th, 1931 :--

Waterloo and District General Hospital, Liverpool, in affiliation with the Hospital of St. John and St. Elizabeth, London."
