GENERAL NURSING COUNCIL FOR ENGLAND AND WALES.

The One Hundred and Twentieth Meeting of the General Nursing Council for England and Wales was held at 20, Portland Place, London, W.I, on January 23rd, the Chairman, Miss E. M. Musson, C.B.E., R.R.C., presiding.

Miss Musson reported that the past year had been a very active one, 86 meetings of the Council and Committees having been held, and remarked upon the steady, loyal and efficient work of the Registrar, downwards.

Election of Chairman.

The first business on the Agenda was the Election of the Chairman of the Council; Miss Musson therefore vacated the Chair after inviting Miss E. S. Haldane, LL.D., C.H., to occupy it.

As there were no other nominations Miss Haldane formally put to the vote the election of Miss Musson as Chairman of the Council for the ensuing year and declared her duly elected.

Miss Musson then resumed the chair, and thanked the Council for electing her, and said that she would do her best to serve it during the ensuing year.

Election of Vice-Chairman.

As no other nominations had been received, Miss Musson formally put to the vote the election of Miss Cox-Davies as Vice-Chairman of the Council for the ensuing year, and declared her duly elected.

Miss Cox-Davies briefly returned thanks for her re-election.

Correspondence.

The correspondence included the following letter from the Registrar of the Graduate Nurses' Association of British Columbia:

as Training Schools for Nurses. It will be most useful to me.

Please discourage graduate nurses, if you know they are thinking of coming to Canada at the present time. Our unemployment situation is bad, since the nurses are (and have been for quite a time) far in excess of the demand for their services. Sincerely yours,

Finance.

On the recommendation of the Finance Committee, bills and claims submitted for payment were approved, and the sum of £50 for postage stamps, £10 for Insurance Stamps and fro for Petty Cash allowed.

Registration.

On the recommendation of the Registration Committee, it was agreed to issue a Certificate, marked "Duplicate" to a Registered Nurse, who had reported the loss of hers twelve months ago, upon the payment by her of a fee of ros.

It was also recommended and agreed to issue Silver Badges, marked "Duplicate," to three Registered Nurses. who had reported the loss of theirs a year ago, on payment by them of the price of the Badge, and the additional expense of engraving the word "Duplicate."

Applications for approval for Registration were consid-

ered, and the following resolutions carried:—
"That the 6 applicants whose applications have been found to be in order, plus 7 by examination, be approved for registration, and that the Registrar be instructed to enter their names in the appropriate parts of the Register.

That the appropriate certificate be granted to each of these applicants, and that authority be hereby given to affix the Seal of the Council to each Certificate."

It was agreed to reinclude in the Register the names of 15 nurses who had hitherto failed to pay their retention fee and now wished their names to be reincluded.

It was agreed to remove the names of 1,912 nurses from the Register, who had failed to pay their retention fees for 1931.

The Registration Committee reported that the number of nurses registered during 1930 was as follows:-
