## Replies to Correspondents.



Mrs. Jenkins (Chelsea). —Get Zymine Peptonising Pow-ders (Fairchild), in glass tubes. They are most convenient for preparing peptonised milk, gruels, &c.

Sister of Faver Ward .-- The chief points to be noticed in infectious cases are whether the patient has been exposed to infection, the length of incubation, the exact date of the first rigor, the nature of the invasion, the symptoms and when they begun, the temperature, the pulse, the respiration, whether there is a rash, and if so, where and of what nature.

Mother of Family.—Apply to the Secretary of the National Health Society, Berners Street, W. Courses of lectures are arranged by the society on all the subjects you mention. A dwelling house should be perfectly dry, the roof should be sound, and the gutters and rain-pipes clear. A sunny aspect is a great preventive of illness.
