her help to the Association has been incessant and indefatigable; and I have a full belief that the movement in which she has for four years taken so warm an interest will eventually come to full fruition. Of course we have encountered opposition in many quarters, and been strangely misunderstood; but this is the fate of all good anovements. It is our business to show that there is no ground for enmity to us; and to smooth away all asperities; and if this is done in the right way, I feel confident that we shall gain more and more public favour. As an old Hospital Physician, and one who has been for many years in private practice, I feel that the Association deserves more influence than it at present possesses. In another place, I have spoken—in the presence of Her Royal Highness and our Chairman-regarding the necessity for the Registration of Midwives. Now, that is another movement which has aroused opposition also; and of so effectual a kind that though a Bill has been introduced into the House, its passage was completely blocked.

The CHAIRMAN: This resolution also needs no seconder. I put it to the meeting. Carried with prolonged applause.

H.R.H. PRINCESS CHRISTIAN: Before we part we ought to return our thanks to Sir DYCE Duckworth for so kindly taking the chair. (Applause.)

The Meeting then concluded.

We are asked to state that it is Miss Annesley KENEALY, who is lecturing now in country districts for the County Council, and not her equally well-known sister Dr. ARABELLA KENEALY, as was stated by a correspondent in this column in a recent issue. We are also requested by Mr. R. GOFTON SALMOND, who as Hon. Secretary has done so much for the Trained Nurses' Annuity Fund, to state that the address of that fund, and also of the British Home for Incurables, is at 73, not 71, Cheapside, as we, in error, recently stated. We gladly make the correction, if only to have the pleasure of expressing the gratitude which so many Nurses feel to Mr. SALMOND, for his great and very successful exertions upon behalf of their worn-out co-workers.

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
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
