
THE FINAL CONFERENCE.

A Farewell Conference of the Hon. Officers of the National Council of Nurses of Great Britain and the International Delegates was held at the British College of Nurses, 39, Portland Place, London, W.1, on Friday, July 8th, 1932, at 10.30 a.m.

Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, President, was in the Chair, and the following were present:

She reminded them that Mlle. Chaptal, President I.C.N., had approved the proposed co-operation in the Scheme between the International Council of Nurses and the League of Red Cross Societies, drafted after consultation with bodies responsible for the Educational Courses for International Students hitherto; and that she had notified that it had been decided that France would form a National Memorial Committee for the provision of an International Student for next year's course.
