and the President expressed great pleasure that the valuable services of Miss Cochrane and Miss Bushby, were still to be retained on the Council.

In returning thanks, Miss Cochrane said it gave her great satisfaction to continue to do all in her power for the welfare of the College.

Appointment of Auditor.

The Treasurer moved:-

"That Mr. H. Rendall Gothard be appointed Auditor for the College for the ensuing year."

This was seconded by Miss Jessie Holmes, and unanimously adopted.

Resolution.

Dr. Fenwick then moved:-

"That the most grateful thanks of the Annual Meeting of the British College of Nurses be, and hereby are, accorded to the President, Vice-Presidents, and the Council of the College for their strenuous and most successful work for the College, and also to Miss Alice Stewart Bryson and the Clerks for the admirable way in which they have fulfilled their duties during the past year."

This was seconded by Miss I. Macdonald and carried

by acclamation.

Miss Macdonald said she would like to propose a very warm vote of thanks to the President, Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, for all she had done for the Nursing Profession, and the monumental work she had achieved in organising, what had proved one of the most valuable reunions of the Nursing Profession now known as "Nightingale Week" in which the College had taken an important part. This was seconded and carried with applause.

Miss Cochrane, in proposing a vote of thanks to Dr. Bedford Fenwick, thought the Nursing Profession could not be grateful enough for all Dr. Fenwick had done. What a wonderful thing it was in these times to have a balance on the right side; and it gave her great pleasure to propose a most hearty vote of thanks for his arduous work.

This was seconded by Miss Beatrice Treasure.

Dr. Fenwick, in reply, expressed thanks, and said he could only say what he had said before, that his work for the College was a labour of love.

The Meeting then terminated.

THE RECEPTION.

The Annual Meeting was followed by a Reception, held by the President and Council, a very popular gathering at which a large number of friends and well wishers of the College joined, in spite of the numerous functions attended so recently during "Nightingale Week."

The College looked its best decorated with lovely flowers of which the summer gives so richly: each room had its colour scheme of pink or blue or crimson, and Fellows and Members visited, with pride, the various departments.
