AN INTRODUCTION TO SOCIAL SCIENCE FOR **HEALTH VISITORS.***

The Author of this concise and practical introduction to Social Science* has supplied a long-felt want which will be welcomed by all those engaged in Public Health or Hospital work.

The book opens with an introduction to Sociology and is followed by a short Historical outline of the development of Public Health work, together with the Bills passed and their dates, and the steps which Public Health Workers might have to take in its administration.

Principles of Relief are explained clearly and definitions of these principles and their working in each branch make a very interesting chapter. Administration of Local Government is tabulated and

outlined in the most instructive manner.

Maternal welfare precedes that of the child, and means presented that are at the disposal of every Mother to-day for the improvement of conditions, the school child normal or defective is dealt with and later the adolescent, together with the part played by education and Social Welfare.

The worker is not forgotten, Factory Welfare is outlined and a few notes are given on Trade Unions.

Special Problems to be faced by all Health Visitors in the care of those unable to care for themselves is a very valuable addition.

Poverty is defined and its reaction on individual and community are surely in the right place in this little volume.

Emergencies causing insecurity, and the Benefits obtain-able are all outlined for the guidance of those needing this knowledge.

The closing chapter is devoted to Housing and Town Planning, and the effect of Housing conditions on the community.

The Author has also given a list of books and other literature to be studied for further knowledge after each chapter, for which many will be grateful. This wonderful handbook of knowledge can only be

appreciated to the full by use, and we commend it to all those studying for examinations for the Diploma of Nursing, as well as Health Visitors and other Public Health workers.

We know the Author understands her subject as few others do, and the easy reading of these pages make a usually unattractive subject a pleasure. H. G. B.

A PUBLIC SERVICE.

Total maximum 1,000 Each Supplier will be furnished with a list monthly giving the names (with position and marks obtained) of all Suppliers receiving Bonus Bonus Bonus (1997) all Suppliers receiving Bonus Payments. His own position and score will be marked on the bottom of the list if he is not amongst those receiving a Bonus.

As an example of the financial benefit, a Supplier sending 100 gallons a day, and obtaining a penny Bonus will receive £12 10s. extra to standard prices for his month's milk. Small and large Suppliers stand equal chances of obtaining Bonuses, and good results depend almost entirely on good management rather than on any financial outlay.

We congratulate Messrs. Cow & Gate on their latest endeavour to stimulate the production of milk of the highest possible purity and quality.
