## MENTAL HOSPITAL MATRONS' ASSOCIATION.

We have pleasure in presenting this month a portrait of Miss E. M. Cuthbert, the recently elected President of the Mental Hospital Matrons' Association, and Matron of the Severalls Mental Hospital, Colchester.

Miss Cuthbert commenced her hospital career at the Eye and Ear Infirmary, Myrtle Street, Liverpool, in 1903. She entered the Southport Infirmary in February, 1906, for general training and then returned to the Eye and Ear Infirmary as a Staff Nurse, where she was promoted to be Out-patient Sister, and afterwards to be Sister of Ear Wards and Theatre. She was also for a short time Outpatient Sister at the Ear and Throat Hospital, Gray's Inn Road, W.C. She then was appointed to the post of Night

Superintendent at the Royal Mental Hospital, Montrose, being in charge of the Male and Female Staff. She held the position of Assistant Matron at the Royal Mental Hospital, Morningside, Edinburgh, from July, 1915-1917, and was then Matron of Ryhope Mental Hospital, Sunderland, until November, 1920, when she took up office as Matron of the Severalls Mental Hospital, Colchester, which position she now holds.

Miss Cuthbert is a State Registered Nurse and an Examiner for the General Nursing Council for England and Wales. She holds the certificate of the Royal Medico-Psychological Association, and acts also as an Examiner for that body.
