- r. On age for probationers especially in relation to their physical development in adolescence.
  - 2. Discipline in training.
- 3. The interdependence of Practical and Theoretical Professional Education.
  - 4. The One Portal to the Register.

Miss Brodie reported that the large majority of Matrons in Scotland who had recently discussed the present system of the education of Nurses, were of opinion that through co-operation there should be a complete reorganisation of the training of Nurses.

The Council expressed firmly their adherence to the One Portal system of examination for admission to the State Registers, as at present provided under the Nurses' Regis-

tration Acts.
