She is a Vice-President of the National Council of Nurses of Great Britain.

## SCHEME FOR THE FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE FOUNDATION ACCEPTED.

It is with great pleasure that we are able to announce that the projected scheme for the

proposed Florence Nightingale Foundation has been accepted by the Grand Council of the International Council of Nurses. As our readers are aware, the proposal for the foundation of an educational memorial to Florence Nightingale dates back to the meeting of the International Council of Nurses in Cologne in 1912, when the proposition was made by Mrs. Fenwick Bedford and seconded by Miss M. Adelaide Nutting, who has always had this memorial closely at heart. Owing to world conditions subsequently, achievement its has necessarily been in abeyance, but it

ideals which the Council has from its inception placed in the forefront of its objects, will be ever in the mind of its new President-Miss Lloyd Still, Superintendent of the Nightingale Training School, whom we welcome in the name of the National Council of Nurses of Great Britain, of which she is a Vice-President, in its official organ, to the high position to which the nurses of the world have elected ĥer.

Miss Clara D. Noyes, National Director of the Nursing Service of the American Red Cross, is well known to members of the International Council of Nurses, as she attended the meeting of the Executive Committee in Copenhagen in 1923, the Congresses in Helsingfors 1925, Montreal in 1929, and the Interim Meeting in Geneva in 1927, and has already held the position of First Vice-President for two terms of office.

Miss Bella G. Alexander is President of the South African Trained Nurses' Association, co-Editor of the South African Nursing Record, its official organ, and a Nurse Member of the General Medical Council in South Africa. She is a wellknown figure at International Congresses.

received fresh impetus at the Montreal Congress upon a letter from Miss Nutting, and Mrs. Bedford Fenwick was later elected Chairman of the International Standing Committee.

For the last twelve months, on her initiative, a Conjoint Committee, composed of members of the International and National Committees, the British Red Cross and the League of Red Cross Societies has been working in London under the chairmanship of Sir Arthur Stanley to formulate a Scheme for its foundation, and this has been presented by Mrs. Bedford Fenwick to the International Council of Nurses in Paris, and approved. It may be anticipated therefore that the nurses there assembled from all over the world, when they return to their respective countries, will secure widespread interest in the Foundation, so that at long last we may have an educational Memorial to Miss Nightingale worthy of her genius and greatness.

## CONGRESS.
