The Report dealt with International Finance, ably presented by Miss E. M. Musson, the Treasurer.

In view of increased expenditure the Financial Committee was unable to recommend a decrease in the *per capita* fee, the *per capita* basis being in the opinion of the majority the fairest method of raising the income of the I.C.N.

With the exception of Germany all National Associations were up to date with their payments.

Our Delegates.

The Report continued "We have to thank our four delegates for their close attention to the business of the Grand Council Meetings, and a special vote of thanks is owing to Miss E. M. Musson for her masterly grip of the financial situation."

Honourable Recognition.

For the first time the I.C.N. received Governmental recognition and honours already announced were reported. Social recognition, both in Paris and Brussels, recorded with gratitude.

THE CONGRESS, PARIS.

Upwards of 2,500 nurses attended the Congress Meetings in Paris-Brussels. Mlle. Chaptal, the President, fulfilled her onerous duties with the utmost distinction and grace. She occupied the Chair at the Opening Session of the Congress at the Salle Pleyel in Paris, on July 10th, and extended to the audience a hearty welcome from the nurses of France. She was supported by His Excellency the French Minister of Public Health and many eminent Government officials.

Miss E. M. Musson delivered an admirable Address on behalf of the Grand Council, which was warmly acclaimed.
