GENERAL NURSING COUNCIL FOR ENGLAND AND WALES.

The one hundred and forty-second meeting of the General Nursing Council for England and Wales was held at the offices of the Council, 20, Portland Place, London, W.1, on January 27th, 1933. The Chairman, Miss E. M. Musson, C.B.E., R.R.C., LL.D., presided.

Election of Chairman.

The minutes having been taken as read and confirmed, the first business before the meeting was the election of Chairman. Miss E. M. Musson therefore vacated the chair, which was taken by the Countess of Limerick. As the only nomination was that of Miss E. M. Musson, the Countess of Limerick announced that she was unanimously elected Chairman for a further term of office. Miss Musson then resumed the chair, with thanks to the Council for reappointing her.

Election of Vice-Chairman.

The Chairman notified the Council that there were two nominations for the position of Vice-Chairman, Miss R. A. Cox-Davies, C.B.E., R.R.C., and Miss M. E. Sparshott, C.B.E., R.R.C., so that a ballot would have to be taken.

The Chairman received eighteen ballot papers, and there were eleven votes recorded in favour of Miss Cox-Davies and Miss Sparshott received seven votes. Miss R. A. Cox-Davies was therefore elected Vice-Chairman.

Correspondence.

The Chairman reported the receipt of a letter from the Ministry of Health, in which it notified the Council that three nominations had been made out of the five seats allocated to its representatives, namely: Mr. W. F. Harper, Dr. Marguerite Henrietta Kettle, and Dr. M. A. Collins. The other two names would be forwarded as soon as the appointments were made.

Reports of Committees. Finance.

On the recommendation of the Finance Committee, bills and claims submitted for payment were approved and £250 for Postage Stamps, £25 for Insurance Stamps, and £20 for Petty Cash allowed.

It was agreed that £5,000 New South Wales Stock be sold, in part payment of the purchase price of the house, No. 22, Portland Place, acquired by the Council.

Registration.

Applications for approval for Registration on January 27th, 1933, were:—General Register, by reciprocity, 8; Supplementary Part of the Register for Sick Children's Nurses, by reciprocity, 1; Fever Nurses, by Examination 8, by reciprocity 1. Total, 18.

It was agreed that 24 Nurses, who had hitherto failed to

It was agreed that 24 Nurses, who had hitherto failed to pay their retention fee, and now wished their names reincluded in the Register, should be re-included.

It was agreed that the names of 1,792 Nurses, who had not paid their Retention Fee for 1933, be removed from the Register, in accordance with the Rules, Part II, Paragraph 5 (3).
