The Sub-Committee beg to recommend that £500 be paid into the Banking account of the Conjoint Committee which will administer the fund for the interim Scholarships, and that at least one Scholarship shall be allocated to England and one to Scotland.

It was reported by the President to the Sub-Committee that the Guy's Hospital Nurses' League had notified the British Red Cross Society that it would donate a Scholarship of £250, and that Dame Sarah Swift had received £250 from nurses through an appeal in the Press and otherwise, so that during the past three months the nurses in Great Britain had given or guaranteed the munificent sum of £2,097 in support of the Florence Nightingale Scholarships.

On the proposal of Miss Monk, seconded by Miss Spar-

shott, the Report was received.

The President, in commenting on the Report, said that the generosity of the nurses had been quite wonderful, and that it was extraordinary that in so short a time £2,000 should have been given or promised. The Appeal had been for £500, but even before the Appeal was sent out £750 had been promised by three Leagues. In view of the large sum contributed by this country, the Sub-Committee recommended that at least one scholarship be allocated to England and one to Scotland.

The President stated that as the money had been required at once, it was now possible with the help of the British Red Cross Society and the League of Red Cross Societies,

to finance the Scholarships required for the interim period, 1933-1934.

With regard to the administration of this money, the President reminded the Meeting that at St. Thomas's Hospital, in July last, the National Florence Nightingale Memorial Committee of Great Britain was officially founded, in the name of which an account has been opened at Coutts' Bank, into which the Scholarship Fund could be paid, which is to be administered by the Conjoint Committee of representatives of the International Council of Nurses and the League of Red Cross Societies.

On the proposal of Miss Dorothy Smith, seconded by Miss Macdonald, it was agreed that the Hon. Treasurer (Miss M. Breay) be authorised to draw a cheque for £500

for the two scholarships.

Miss Allbutt proposed and Miss Hughes seconded that the Report be adopted. This was agreed.
