CANCER HOSPITAL'S NEW BUILDINGS.

OPENING BY HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN.

Amid scenes of great enthusiasm, the Queen opened the New Wing of the Cancer Hospital, Fulham Road, on Wednesday, May 9th, 1934. Included in the new building is Granard House, which consists of a private wing for the accommodation of paying patients, the total cost of the

building being approximately £150,000.

The Opening Ceremony was held in a large marquee in the hospital grounds, where a large and distinguished

company assembled, and among those present were:—

Wakelin Barratt, M.D., F.R.C.S., F.R.C.P., Master of the Society of Apothecaries; Sir Holburt Waring, C.B.E., M.S., F.R.C.S., President of the Royal College of Surgeons of England; the Right Hon. the Lord Dawson of Penn, G.C.V.O., K.C.B., M.D., F.R.C.P., President of the Royal College of Physicians of London; Lt.-Colonel S. Boyle, M.C., J.P., the Worshipful the Mayor of Chelsea; Dr. Edwin Deller, LL.D., Principal of the University of London; Sir Ernest Graham-Little, M.D., F.R.C.P., M.P., Member of Parliament for the University of London; the Lord Horder of Ashford, K.C.V.O., M.D., Consulting Physician; Mr. W. Received by the Earl of Granard, K.P., G.C.V.O., President of the Hospital, the Queen was conducted in procession to the marquee through a guard of honour formed by nurses in uniform and boys from the Oratory Central School. At the entrance of the marquee a bouquet of carnations was presented to Her Majesty by a member of the Nursing Staff, Miss G. Jones.

Lord Granard then invited the Queen to declare the New

Wing open, saying: "We are to-day taking a step forward in the world's combat with a cruel and mortal disease, and we know that in all these endeavours we approach more nearly to success. The tide runs with us all the time, and principally through the wonderful research work done at the Cancer Hospital and other hospitals throughout the United Kingdom and the world generally. The delay, alas! has been terrible, both for the patient and for the scientist, but we are told, and we believe, that there has been a marked and sure progress, and that, even if not now or in the immediate future, we are moving forward steadily to the day when this terrible disease will be crushed."

The Queen then declared the new extension open, and passed from the marquee to make a tour of inspection.

The new building of the Cancer Hospital consists of Granard House, so named after the President, containing 29 beds for the reception of patients of limited means, who can contribute towards the cost of their maintenance and Here private rooms are most tastefully treatment. equipped for patients, where the cost ranges from four to six guineas per week.

Consulting rooms and officers' rooms are consistently well fitted up. The furniture is of oak and the decorations are generally cream colour; the beautiful rainbow-coloured rubber with which the corridors and stairs are

covered has a delightful effect of brightness.

The building also contains the new Out Patient Department, the new Radiological Department, and the new Boiler House, which supplies the whole of the Hospital and adjoining buildings with hot water for heating and domestic purposes.
