## EDITORIAL.

THE INAUGURAL MEETING OF THE FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION.

The Inaugural Meeting of the Florence Nightingale International Foundation which took place at 15, Manchester Square, London, on July 5th will remain for ever a Red Letter Day in the memories of those privileged to take part in it.

Over twenty years have elapsed since Miss Nightingale's passing, and still, deep in the hearts of Nurses is the desire to found a Memorial to her, which shall express somewhat of their appreciation of, and pride in, the great Founder of Modern Nursing, and their indebtedness to her teaching.

Sir Arthur Stanley, Chairman of the British Red Cross Society, presided, and in welcoming the assembled Delegates most heartily, read cables of regret and good wishes from Japanese and Chinese Delegates unable to be present.

Cordial Good Wishes from Her Majesty the Queen.

The Chairman then said he was privileged to announce the reception of the following telegram from Her Majesty the Queen, addressed to Dame Alicia Lloyd Still:—

I AM INTERESTED TO LEARN THAT THE INTERNATIONAL MEMORIAL TO FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE IS BEING INAUGURATED TO-DAY, AND I AM GLAD TO KNOW THAT IT IS TO TAKE AN EDUCA-TIONAL FORM, AS THIS WOULD UNDOUBTEDLY HAVE COMMENDED ITSELF TO MISS NIGHTINGALE WHO HAD SO MUCH AT HEART THE EDUCATION OF NURSES AND THE TRAINING OF A GREAT NURSING SERVICE, NOT ONLY IN THIS COUNTRY BUT THROUGHOUT THE WORLD. I EXTEND A WARM WELCOME TO ALL THE DELEGATES FROM FOREIGN LANDS AND FROM THE BRITISH DOMINIONS WHO HAVE ASSEMBLED IN LONDON FOR THE INAUGURATION OF THE MEMORIAL. I SHALL FOLLOW THE PROGRESS OF THE FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION WITH INTEREST, AND I SEND ONE AND ALL CONCERNED MY CORDIAL GOOD WISHES.
