THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF NURSES.

Miss Anna Schwarzenberg, Executive Secretary, I.C.N., writes in a very hopeful spirit of her responsible duties, and is evidently throwing herself into the difficult, but most interesting, work with enthusiasm, and is already taking thought for the Meeting of the Board of Directors, due to meet next July, when many important matters will come up for consideration, especially in connection with the meeting of the Grand Council due to meet in London in 1937, and also the progress made by the Florence Nightingale International Foundation.

Miss Schwarzenberg writes to the Board of Directors: "It is intended that each National Florence Nightingale Memorial Committee should feel direct responsibility for doing its share in securing a proportionate part of the large sum which will be necessary to ensure the work of the Foundation on a permanent basis, and that scholarships of £250 shall be collected by the National Committees." The scheme of the Foundation provides that each National Committee shall nominate its own scholars. Miss Schwarzenberg considers that it is essential that the I.C.N. be kept well informed by the Member Organisations of developments, so that these bodies can work together for the benefit of the Foundation.

International Union against Tuberculosis.

Miss Suffczynska, President of the National Council of Polish Professional Nurses, represented the I.C.N. at a conference at Warsaw in September of the International Union Against Tuberculosis, and Mrs. Kidd, the new President of the New Zealand Trained Nurses' Association, has promised to represent the I.C.N. at the International Congress on Citizenship to be held at Melbourne in November. Miss Take Hagiwara, President of the Nurses' Association of the Japanese Empire, will be present at the Conference to be held by the League of Red Cross Societies at Tokyo this month. The President, Miss C. D. Noyes, and Mrs. Pon Yen were unable to accept the invitation to be present at this important Conference.

Miss Schwarzenberg will welcome a report of the meeting from any other members of the Board I.C.N. who may be present. She read a paper on "The Personality of the Nurse" at Berne in August during the second postgraduate course of the International Hospitals Association.

Generous Donation, from Holland.

At the last meeting of Nosokomos it was decided to give 500 guldens to the I.C.N. for use in connection with the Library. It was stated that Nosokomos hoped "that the small sum would contribute to the development of the international study of Nursing." This very generous gift will be most gratefully received, and will be most useful in enabling the Council to have books and periodicals bound and classified.

New Members of the Board.

As all new Presidents of member associations become ex-officio members of the Board of Directors and of the Florence Nightingale International Memorial Committee, it is reported that Miss Ruby Simpson, O.B.E., has been elected President of the Canadian Nurses' Association; Mrs. E. Kidd, President of the New Zealand Trained Nurses' Association; Miss Rosa Militar, President of the Filipino Nurses' Association; Miss Florence Goodacre, President of the South African Trained Nurses' Association, and Miss Susan Francis, President of the American Nurses' Association.

Education Committee.

As the Education Report had not received the official approval of the Board of Directors, it was regretfully decided that it was not possible to publish it for the Conference of the Red Cross in Tokyo. This important report will be circulated to the members of the Board of Directors for their consideration before their next meeting.

Public Health Nursing Committee.

A circular letter has been sent out to the members of the Public Health Committee.

New members have been nominated on to the Private Duty Nursing Committee and the Mental Nursing and Hygiene Committee.

Health Statistics Committee.

A questionnaire has been issued on Health Statistics of Nurses to groups of Matrons in each member country.

Association Badges.

A collection of Badges adopted by Member Associations is now being made for display at Headquarters in Geneva, and the South African Nurses' Badge has recently been added to the collection.

The National Council of Nurses of Great Britain has so far not adopted a Badge. It is a question which might be taken into consideration.
