### THE NURSES' ASSOCIA-TION OF CHINA.

The quarterly issue of the Nursing Journal of China, just received, devotes much space to Miss Florence Nightingale, the record of her work, tributes to her memory; to the Florence Nightingale Memorial Foundation; to the report made by Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, Chairman of the Florence Nightingale Committee of the International Council of Nurses, in Paris in 1933, and the action then taken.

Speaking of the decision taken to form National Memorial Committees in support of the Founda-tion, Mrs. Victoria Pon Yen (President of the Nurses' Association of China), after enumerating the Committees already formed, says: "It is hoped that our country will soon follow their example. Of course it will be hard to do with the money-raising capacities of our National with African Trained Red Cross and our nursing profession. But we hope it is the way that all our nurses may have the opportunity to take the post-graduate study

in a foreign country. This scheme is not only important, but urgent. I hope that at our coming N.A.C. Conference every one will be prepared to discuss and to carry the project into practice.'

In regard to the celebration of Miss Nightingale's Birthday we read: "As the years come and go, this day is becoming more and more a great National Day for the Nurses of China. Time for graduations, Public Health Demonstra-tions, Visits to the Hospitals by the friends, Speeches, Lectures, Pageants, Processions, Plays, Demonstrations, and in all ways making it a Day in which to remember the work of the 'Queen of all Nurses.'"
