The fact that Mrs. Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the wife of the President, U.S.A., and H.E. the Hon. Lady Lindsay, the wife of the British Ambassador, are Honorary Chairmen, and that Mrs. William Kinnicutt Draper, of the New York Chapter, is Chairman of the Committee, with Mr. Harvey P. Gibson as Treasurer, and that the Committee is apparently composed of the Chairmen of the most important Chapters of the American Red Cross, augurs well for financial success in U.S.A.

The Red Cross Division has issued a charming little pamphlet containing a portrait of Miss Florence Nightingale. Just one little error has crept in. In alluding to the initiative taken by the International Council of Nurses in Cologne in 1912 to commemorate the life and work of Miss Nightingale, it is stated that "no measures were taken during the ensuing two years."

This is not correct. Miss L. L. Dock, the then Hon. Secretary of the I.C.N., came to Europe early in 1914, and together with Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, had an interview with the Principal, Miss Margaret Tuke, and laid before her on February 20th, 1914, the proposal of the I.C.N. for the promotion, with the help of Bedford College, of a Chair of Nursing and Health, as an International Memorial to Miss Nightingale. Miss Tuke extended to the deputation her kindest sympathy, but alas! the powers "that be" were not propitious! Correspondence on the subject is preserved in files of letters for the benefit of historic accuracy, should a History of Nursing Organisation ever be written.

FIRST DOMINION SCHOLARSHIP.

Miss B. G. Alexander, R.R.C., President of the South African Trained Nurses' Association, sends the good news that the selection for the first South African Florence Nightingale Scholar, 1934-1935, has now been made, and the Selection Committee has recommended Miss Norman, who is at present a staff nurse at the Addington Hospital, Durban. We learn that the Committee has been most careful in its choice, and has taken into consideration the personality as well as the educational and professional ability of the nurse.

As we have announced, this whole Scholarship is the gift of Mr. A. H. Smith, O.B.E., of Durban, in memory of his wife.

A preliminary meeting to form a National Florence Nightingale Committee has recently been convened at Cape Town.

Hearty congratulations to South Africa for securing the first Dominion Scholarship. Miss Norman will receive a warm welcome in England.
