THE BRITISH COLLEGE OF NURSES.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL MEETING.

The eighty-sixth Meeting of the Council of the British College of Nurses was held on Saturday, March 17th, at

39, Portland Place, London, W.1, at 2.15 p.m.

The President, Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, was in the Chair, and there were present: Miss A. M. Bushby, Vice-President; Miss M. G. Allbutt, Miss M. S. Cochrane, R.R.C., Miss G. Le Geyt, Miss I. Macdonald, Fellows; Miss H. G. Ballard and Miss E. J. Haswell, Members.

Prayers having been read by the Secretary, the Minutes

of the last Meeting were confirmed.

BUSINESS ARISING OUT OF THE MINUTES.

Letter from S. E. Edge, Esq., Mayor of Walsall, stating "I now have the pleasure to send you herewith the following for you to use in connection with the History Section of the British College of Nurses." These gifts comprised a beautiful photograph of Sister Dora, in her youth, of her Souvenirs, and a large amount of literature relating to her life. It was agreed that a special Vote of Thanks be sent to Mr. S. E. Edge, the Mayor of Wallsall, and also to the Mayor's Secretary, for their kindness and courtesy in bestowing upon the College this valuable and comprehensive data relating to Sister Dora.

Letter from Miss M. C. Grobel, M.A., General Secretary, National Council of Women, in reply to the letter sent on February 23rd, stating: "It is quite in order for your Council not to support any recommendations made by the National Council of Women affecting the statutory and educational status of nurses as provided for under the

Nurses' Registration Act.

It was agreed to emphasise the opinion of the Council, that on matters affecting the professional education and status of registered nurses, they should be consulted before public action is taken by the N.C.W.

Postcard from the Hon. Secretary, Women's Employment Federation stating: "My Committee will much regret the

decision of the British College of Nurses."

Letter sent from the British College of Nurses to the Registrar, Mr. W. S. Farmer, General Nursing Council for Scotland:

The British College of Nurses.

February 26th, 1934.

DEAR SIR.—I shall be obliged if you will be good enough to inform me how the scheme for the General Nursing Council for Scotland, that girls outside the Nurse Training Schools may be taught Anatomy, Physiology and Hygiene, and examined in these subjects outside the Nurse Training Schools, is to be financed. Is it proposed that the cost of these educational courses shall be paid for by parents, by the State, by the Rates, or by the General Nursing Council for Scotland? This important aspect of the proposal is not alluded to in the new Regulations sent by you for consideration to the General Nursing Council for England and Wales, and also for publication in The British JOURNAL OF NURSING.

An early reply to this question will oblige, as our President is addressing a Meeting on the economic aspect of prehospital teaching for probationers at an early date.

was presented to the College by Miss I. Macdonald.

Miss A. M. Bushby, Chairman of the History of Nursing Section, reported:

Two letters signed by Miss Nightingale addressed to her baker and referring to her own health.

The President thanked Miss Bushby, and the Report was adopted.

THE SECRETARY'S STATEMENT.

The Secretary reported that since the last Meeting of the Council there had been 19 visitors to the College. That in the History Section "Good Words" 1856 was purchased, costing 6s.; with a balance in hand of 3s. 5d. this leaves a deficit of 2s. 7d.
