programmes).

(b) Good Nutrition of Mothers and Little Childrenthus continuing the propaganda of 1934 on nutrition.

These two subjects—which jointly include the mental as well as the physical welfare of the expectant and nursing mother, the infant and the young child—the Council advises should find a place in local and in national propaganda programmes. Lectures, discussions, articles and paragraphs in the Press, as well as religious discourses and so on, can profitably deal with such questions.

The Council will gladly advise on and help in the organisation of such propaganda and the choice of subjects for

lectures, articles and other selected treatment.
