A letter from Miss B. M. West, M.B.C.N. (Matron, Southgate Isolation Hospital), saying she has been awarded the King's Silver Jubilee Medal.

A letter to the President from Miss I. Hutton, B.A., M.B.C.N., *re* her letter of protest sent to *Time and Tide*, concerning an article published in that paper, entitled "A Letter of Thanks."

REPORT OF THE HISTORY OF NURSING SECTION.

Miss A. M. Bushby reported :

(1) "The Protestant Deaconess on the Continent," with a few remarks on the Duties of Her Office. This pamphlet belonged to Mrs. Gaskell, and is very rare; it also quotes from the first pamphlet written by Miss Florence Nightingale after her visit to Kaiserswerth. I am giving this to the History Section. It is dated 1852.

(2) "The Nurse," a poem translated from the Italian of Luigi Tansillo, by William Roscoe (the third edition), published in Liverpool, 1804. We have now three editions of this book. This one is interesting as much is written on the fly-leaf about Roscoe's sayings (he lived in Liverpool). This book belonged to the late Mr. Augustine Birrell. I am giving this book to the History Section.

(3) "A Book of Golden Deeds," by Charlotte Yonge. This copy was given by Miss Florence Nightingale to Mrs Walker, in grateful remembrance; offered by Florence Nightingale, London, 1866.

(4) A photograph of Miss Nightingale on her return from the Crimea. She only sat once for her photograph, and that was at the request of Queen Victoria.

that was at the request of Queen Victoria. (5) A letter from Miss Florence Nightingale to Jas. Pattison Walker, Esq., M.O., with original envelope, on Dr. Walker being appointed to the Board of Health, India.

(6) A letter from Miss Florence Nightingale to Mrs. Walker, in answer to one written to Miss Nightingale asking for her photograph. Most interesting.

These gifts were received with applause. The President, in thanking Miss Bushby, thought the College owed her a great debt of gratitude for these beautiful gifts, which she had so generously presented.

The Report was adopted.

THE SECRETARY'S STATEMENT.

It was reported that among the many visitors to the College there had been distinguished international members of the Nursing Profession, Dean Annie Goodrich, R.N., Sc.D., M.A., and Sister Bergljot Larsson, accompanied by Norwegian students.
