REPORT OF THE COUNCIL MEETING.

The one hundred and eighth Meeting of the Council of the British College of Nurses was held at 39, Portland Place, London, W. on Saturday, March 21st, 1936, at 2.30 p.m.

The President, Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, was in the Chair, and there were present: Miss M. Breay and Miss I. Macdonald, Vice-Presidents; Miss M. G. Allbutt, Miss J. C. Cowie, Miss F. M. Campbell, Miss Le Geyt, Fellows; Miss H. G. Ballard, Member. Several Members of Council were unavoidably prevented from attending the Meeting.

Prayers having been read by the Secretary, the Minutes of the last Meeting were confirmed.
