#### THE NEXT MEETING OF THE COUNCIL.

It was unanimously agreed that the next Meeting of the Council be held on Saturday, April 18th, 1936, at 2.30 p.m. OTHER BUSINESS.

The President reported a letter received from Miss H. Ballard protesting against the new Educational Scheme adopted by the General Nursing Council for England and Wales. Miss Ballard who was asked by the President to speak on it pointed out that the new scheme excludes Sister Tutors as lecturers and examiners to nurses in training, in Anatomy and Physiology. These new regulations diverted the prestige and fees connected with this work from the Sister Tutors to the medical staff, which was a grave injustice to Sister Tutors who had borne the expense of taking the higher examination and done years of useful work; consequently many would lose their posts as Sister Tutors, or have their remuneration reduced.

Miss Ballard reported that the League of Sister Tutors were considering a Resolution of Protest to be sent to the General Nursing Council for England and Wales and the Ministry of Health and other bodies.

After some discussion it was agreed unanimously that a Resolution in support of the views of Sister Tutors be sent from the Council to the Ministry of Health.

#### DOCUMENTS PRESENTED TO PARLIAMENT.

At the request of the President, Miss M. Breay then read a digest of the "Report of the Scottish Depart mental Committee on the Training of Nurses" presented to Parliament by the Secretary of State for Scotland, and promised to prepare an article upon it for publication in the April issue of The British Journal of Nursing.

She also drew attention to the "Bill to amend the Midwives Acts, 1902 to 1936," presented by the Minister of Health in the Hayes of Commons on March 18th, and

of Health in the House of Commons on March 18th, and advised those present to procure and study it.

The meeting then terminated.
