"BROKEN HOMES."

In a letter to the Press the Chairman of the Executive Borstal Association writes of "Broken Homes," in which he states: "Although I believe there are no fewer than 150 definitions of the expression 'broken home,' there are five broad general categories:—1. No known parents; 2. Parents separated; 3. Mother living with a man not her husband; father living with a woman not his wife; 4. Parents perpetually at loggerheads; 5. Children

After perusal of innumerable records of the home circumstances of Borstal boys over a period of years I cannot resist the conclusion that it is something more than a coincidence that at least 80 per cent. of these boys come from 'broken homes.' Not long ago I drew the attention of the authorities to this phenomenon, and I found that they were quite aware of its significance. In support of my conclusion there is the authority of Dr. Cyril Burt, who places defective family relationship high among the causes of juvenile delinquency, also the authority of Mr. Leo Page, who in his recent work 'Crime and the Community' emphasises the point, and now we have in the fifth report on the work of the Children's Branch, just published, a quotation of the opinion of the Warden of the Philanthropic Society's School, Redhill, to the effect that he had formed the opinion that the 'broken home ' is the biggest single factor in juvenile delinquency.
