A Meeting of the General Nursing Council for Scotland was held at 18, Melville Street, Edinburgh, on April 22nd, 1938. Colonel D. J. Mackintosh, the Vice-Chairman, presided. Apologies for absence were intimated from Sir John Lorne MacLeod and Miss Niccol.

Education and Examination Committee.

THE REGISTER OF NURSES MAINTAINED BY THE GEN. NURSING COUNCIL FOR SCOTLAND.

We have received from the Registrar of the General Nursing Council for Scotland a copy of the first printed Register of Nurses maintained by the General Nursing Council for Scotland in Pursuance of the Nurses' Registration (Scotland) Act, 1919. Hitherto the Register has appeared in typed form.

The Register is handsomely bound in blue cloth inscribed in gilt, and the make-up differs little from that issued by the General Nursing Council for England and Wales. The paper and printing are excellent.

We are specially pleased to welcome this useful Register of Nurses and to find that the principle for which we made a strenuous claim in the make-up of the first English Register in 1923 has been adoptednamely, the insertion of the qualifications of Nurses on the Register, so that the name of the Institution at which they were trained and standard of training can be seen at a glance—privileges of which it was proposed by the matrons and their lay supporters on the General Nursing Council for England and Wales, the existing nurses should be deprived. The battle royal which ensued on this attempted injustice was won by the six independent nurse representatives on the Council, and for which victory of right over might we were severely penalised and deprived of the office of Chair of the Registration Committee!

The Scottish Register as designed is indeed a model of inclusive information, as in its five columns the Registered No., Name, Address and Date of Registration and Qualifications are all inserted. A useful little addition is given, the letters A, B, C, D, E, F, prefixing the Registered No. in column one, denoting the six

sections of nurses registered.

Under explanations, M.P.A. denotes the Royal Medico-Psychological Association, which in our opinion should have ceased to function after the Nurses' Registration Act came into effect; S.B. of H., Scottish Board of Health; E.N., Existing Nurse; N.T., Nurse in Training before issue of Rules; and A.E., After Examination (Nurse who has passed the Council's examinations).

It will be seen, therefore, that justice has been done, in the compilation of the Scottish Register, to the various trainees, no easy task, and one upon which the General Nursing Council for Scotland is to be warmly congratulated.

LEGACIES FOR NURSES.

Among the legacies of Miss Victoria Daunt, S.R.N., of St. Thomas Mansions, Lambeth, late Assistant Matron, Middlesex Hospital, who died at Buckfast, leaving £7,883 (net personal effects to Miss Alicia Frances Jane Lloyd Still, formerly Matron of St. Thomas's Hospital.

A restored memorial tablet marking the site of the Smithfield martyrdoms was recently unveiled in the north wall of St. Bartholomew's Hospital, E.C., by the Ven. E. N. Sharpe, Archdeacon of London.

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
