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this had been successfully accomplished. Considering that the ordinary yearly expenditure amounted to about $\pounds 250,000$ and the assured income from investments to only $\pounds 67,000$, this was no mean achievement. There had, however, been no money available for capital reconstruction.

Towards the £325,100 the Committee had in hand and under deed £50,410 and accordingly felt justified in beginning the first item of reconstruction—the extension of the Cavell Home for Nurses, the new aural wards, and the extensions of the laboratories.

All friends of the London must now unite to make the Appeal the success, such fine work deserves.
