THE REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

The report of the Education Committee Meeting was presented.

Miss M. S. Cochrane, R.R.C., was in the chair. Since the last meeting of the Committee excellent lectures of a varied character had been well attended and much appreciated. The Administration Classes as usual were patronised with great interest by Fellows and Members. A course of lectures on Air Raid Precautions had also given great satisfaction to many members who could conveniently avail themselves of this course.

It was agreed to recommend that grants towards the expenses in the following be considered for the year 1938-1939 :-

1. One grant of £7 to take a Course on Nutrition and Food Values, Practical Dietetics and Artisan Cookery at Battersea Polytechnic.

2. One grant of ± 10 or two grants of ± 5 each towards expenses for Housekeeping Course.

3. Two grants of £2 2s. each to take a Course of Lectures and Examination at the Tropical Diseases Hospital, Endsleigh Gardens.

4. One grant towards the expenses of Health Visitors' Course. It was agreed to recommend that any further educational grants be left to the discretion of the President.
