# OPENING OF THE ADMISSION HOSPITAL AND CONVALESCENT VILLAS.

The Opening of the Admission Hospital and Convalescent Villas, an extension of the Kent County Mental Hospital. Maidstone, on May 27th, by the Rt. Hon. Walter Elliot M.C., M.P., Minister of Health, attracted a very large and

representative gathering.

The guest arrived at the new buildings, where a crowded audience was assembled under awnings erected for the occasion. We found an imposing guard of honour consisting of graded nurses, smart and attractive and white glovedand male attendants, drawn up to receive Mr. Walter Elliot, M.C., M.P., who paused from time to time to exchange a few words with them.

Arrived at the platform, he was received by the Chairman of the Visiting Committee and the Chairman of the Board of Control, Sir Laurence Brock, C.B., the Medical Superintendent and others. After various introductions Mr. Walter Elliot proceeded to unlock the door of the new block and declared it open. The Lord Bishop of Rochester

offered the Dedicatory prayer.

The Chairman of the Mental Hospitals Committee spoke of the evolution and progression of the treatment of mental diseases since the main hospital was built, 100 years ago. Now not "detention" but "healing" was the predominating idea. In this new building everything that modern science had achieved was provided. But all their efforts would be wasted without the devoted men and women who served there.

Miss Macaulay, the Matron, stood at the head of a band of devoted Sisters and Nurses, who showed such boundless patience and kindness that letters of gratitude from patients and friends were almost a matter of routine.

Mr. Elliot referred to the Nurses' Home, which stands outside the Hospital grounds, which he affirmed was the finest attached to any institution. Mental nurses needed the best conditions that can possibly be given; we all knew how much more patient we could be when we had rest.

He, himself, was sometimes glad not to have to deal with the subnormal when he left the House of Commons.

Referring to the new methods of treatment in the mentally afflicted, he spoke with approval of the occupational side, of which he received a practical demonstration. The Minister was presented with a very beautiful handmade carpet, made by eighteen of the patients. The Matron was reported to have said that the Hospital would not seem the same after it had gone, and indeed it was a. thing of beauty and skill.

After the official opening, visitors were permitted to inspect the new Admission Block, which is for the reception

of patients of all classes.

At the entrance are the consultation rooms where new admissions are received, classified, examined, and their cases investigated. One of the first essential approaches to mental disorders, is to investigate and treat all those physical conditions that so largely contribute to the cause and it is for this reason that in this unit all modern methods are directed to restoring patients to a healthy physical condition. Too much space would be occupied by attempting to describe the amenities of these buildings, but imagine the machinery of an up-to-date modern Hospital and the equipment of a super Nursing Home, and you may form some idea of this latest venture in mental treatment.

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The dormitories with their dainty furnishing were very attractive. The bedspreads of buff and green, on which reposed the fascinating night-dress cases, of a design completely original, and soft green bedside mats were much previous page next page
