Nursing Service. In October, 1918, she was appointed Matron of Princess Mary's Royal Air Force Nursing Service. In the following November she became the first Matron-in-Chief, and was responsible for the entire organisation of the Royal Air Force Nursing Service, a position which she held until her retirement in 1930. During this period of office she was the Air Ministry Representative on the Joint Voluntary Aid Detachment Council.

After her retirement, she took an active interest in Red Cross activities, and was for several years Vice-President of the Hertfordshire Branch. She is closely connected with the Invalid Children's Aid Association, as a member of the Executive Committee and as Chairman of the Homes Administration Committee.
