was attributed to gastric causes, compared with one day in $7\frac{1}{2}$ for tramcar workers. These conclusions are accepted by the present conference.

Since the omnibus stoppage a new agreement was reached between the London Passenger Transport Board and the Transport and General Workers' Union, providing for improved terminal facilities and breaks in each spell of duty equivalent to not less than 5 per cent. of the journey time, but it is too early to say what effect these changes may have on the men's health.

The conference considered that an enquiry into hospital records was not promising, but is examining methods of discovering the causes of gastric sickness and is trying to measure the influence, if any, of irregular meals, nervous strain, exhaust fumes and speedier services.

NEW SOURCE OF RADIUM.

What is hoped may prove to be a new source of radium is being investigated in Canada, where, as described by a special correspondent of *The Times*, Mme. Curie-Joliot, elder daughter of Mme. Curie, discoverer of radium, has begun experiments on samples of pitch-blende from the Eldorado Gold Mines at Great Bear Lake, Ontario.

It is hoped that they will lead to the recovery from the ore of a radium group of minerals in sufficient quantities to warrant commercial working. Hitherto these minerals, particularly that known as Radium D, have been produced only in the laboratory.

The ore body is reported to be large and the pitchblende of high grade. The new vein has already been opened up for a distance of 160 feet and is now being explored for the first time at depth. At the central working shaft-sinking has reached 740 feet, and will continue to 890 feet.

Mme. Curie-Joliot, who is aged forty-one, entered the Curie Laboratories of the Radium Institute, became a Doctor of Science in 1926, and a year later married M. Frédéric Joliot, a brilliant chemist.
