THE BRITISH COLLEGE OF NURSES.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL MEETING.

A meeting of the Council of the British College of Nurses was held at 39, Portland Place, London, W.1., on Saturday, October 22nd, 1938, at 2.30 p.m.

The President, Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, was in the Chair, and there were present Miss M. Breay and Miss A. M. Bushby, Vice-Presidents; Miss M. S. Cochrane, R.R.C., Miss E. F. Brownsdon, Miss M. M. Ingman, Miss D. G. Tilby and Miss I. Macdonald, Fellows; and Miss K. Fogarty and Miss C. E. Nelson, Members.

Regrets for absence were received from Miss E. Brodie and Miss D. M. Dickinson.

BUSINESS ARISING.

It was reported that in accordance with the decision of the last Meeting of the Council a letter conveying the thanks and appreciation of the Council was sent to Lord Alness for his service rendered to British women in bringing before the House of Lords the British Nationality and Aliens Bill.

The President, in reporting the letter received from Lord Alness (published in the October issue of the BRITISH JOURNAL OF NURSING), was sure that the Council was most gratified to receive his Lordship's encouraging reply and advised those present to communicate with him on the subject and also to try and secure the interest of the Member of Parliament of their constituency in support of the Bill.

CORRESPONDENCE.

A number of letters were received and considered. Several from members in financial stress. Recommendations for help were agreed. Reporting illness and other difficulties. Letters announcing appointments.

PROSPECTUS OF A PRE-NURSING SCHEME.

A circular letter and prospectus of a Pre-Nursing Scheme for external students at the West London Hospital, Hammersmith, was received from Miss C. M. Courtenay, the Matron, and considered. The scheme provides for the teaching of nurse students attending daily on the lines of a Preliminary Nursing School. The Council read the suggestions with interest and directed that a letter of thanks be sent to Miss Courtenay wishing it success.

ACCIDENT TO MR. WATES.

The Council learned with sincere regret from Mrs. Wates that her husband had sustained a fractured femur as the result of being knocked down by a motor cycle. The Council directed that a specially warm letter of sympathy be sent, wishing Mr. Wates a speedy recovery.

Documents were received from the Secretary of the National Council of Women. Copy of article on the "Greater Humanity Campaign" quoted in the October issue of BRITISH JOURNAL OF NURSING, kind letters on the subject of." Women, Power and International Appeasement " from Miss L. Lind-af-Hageby and from the Rev. R. W. Thomson, Congregational Church, Bristol, re appeal to the youth of the world to outlaw bombardment from the air.

The President emphasised the conviction that murder of non-combatants by aerial bombardment should not be submitted to by civilised people, to accept death by such means was evidence of cowardice. Women should make barbarism impossible.

Letter read from Miss Hogg, giving an interesting account of her experience at the British Hospital, Haifa, Palestine.

The President presented the Financial Statement for the month.

THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF NURSES OF GREAT BRITAIN.

A discussion took place on the Resolutions and Amendments to the Constitution of the National Council of Nurses which appeared on the Agenda for the Executive Committee of the N.C.N. on Monday, October 17th.

It was reported that the Resolution submitted by the Council of the British College of Nurses would be acted upon, *i.e.*, to appoint a Special Sub-committee to consider the Constitution as a whole and make recommendations to the Executive Committee.
