FINANCE.

The Chairman reported the request from Miss Daisy Bridges that the International Students be allowed to attend the Conference. It was unanimously agreed that the students be invited, and the Chairman notified her willingness to present the students with tickets. It was also agreed that Miss Anna Schwarzenberg and Miss Nan Dorsey be invited to attend.

REPORT FROM HON. TREASURER AND AUDITED STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS.

Miss M. Breay, Hon. Treasurer, presented the Audited Statement of Accounts, which showed a balance in each of the three accounts.

It was unanimously agreed that the balance of £130 16s. 8d. standing in the No. 3 Account (International Congress of Nurses Fund) be invested and donated to the four delegates of the National Council of Nurses deputed to represent the Council at the International Congress of Nurses in the United States of America to be held in 1941.

REPORT OF THE GOLDEN JUBILEE CONFERENCE OF THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN.

Miss E. S. Innes, who attended, as the delegate of the National Council of Nurses, the Golden Jubilee Con-ference of the International Council of Women, held in Edinburgh in July, 1938, prepared an excellent report, which was received.

It was agreed that a vote of thanks be forwarded to Miss Innes for the care and trouble she had taken in preparing the report.

INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF NURSES.

The Chairman reported letters from Miss Effie Taylor re the International Congress of Nurses to take place in 1941.

A report was notified from Miss Anna Schwarzenberg, Executive Secretary, International Council of Nurses, with Questionnaire.

A request was reported through Miss Schwarzenberg from Miss Julia C. Stimson, President, American Nurses' Association, and Chairman, Congress Committee, 1941, that she might be allowed to have a copy of the accounts and any further particulars available in connection with the Congress expenses in London in 1937. It was agreed that information be forwarded to Miss Stimson.

The Chairman intimated her readiness to supplement such documents.

The Chairman reported the receipt of the balance sheet from Miss Musson, Treasurer of the International Council of Nurses, to December, 1937, which was available for those interested. The accounts showed receipts to be £5,412

12s. 21d. and expenditure £3,365 19s. 10d. The Chairman reported a letter she had received from Miss Lavinia L. Dock, first Hon. Secretary of the International Council of Nurses, offering as a gift to International Headquarters the Illuminated Address presented to her in 1922, when she found it necessary to relinquish the Hon. Secretaryship after 23 years' work.

The Chairman reported that she had communicated with Miss Schwarzenberg, and arrangements would be made to receive the Address with gratitude and pleasure.

It was agreed that a letter of thanks be forwarded to Miss Lavinia Dock.
