RED CROSS NEWS.

The League of Red Cross Monthly Bulletin has the following interesting news, announced in June :--

FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE FOUNDATION.

In collaboration with the Yugoslav Association of Nurses, the Yugoslav Red Cross has constituted a National Florence Nightingale Memorial Committee of Yugoslavia, on which the Red Cross is represented by three members and the Association of Nurses by three. The Chairman for this year is Mme. Naka N. Spasich, of the Red Cross Central Committee; Mlle. Milena Yanich, of the Association of Nurses, is the Secretary. The new committee has its address at the headquarters of the Yugoslav Red Cross.

As a memorial to Clara D. Noyes, late director of its Nursing Services, the American Red Cross is awarding each year, for five years, two scholarships for the International Nursing Courses run by the Florence Nightingale International Foundation. One scholarship is awarded to an American nurse, selected by the American Red Cross, the American Nurses' Association, and the Florence Nightingale Foundation Committee of America. The other is awarded to a foreign nurse selected on the recommendation of the League of Red Cross Societies. Last year the foreign scholarship was granted to a Chinese nurse. This year it goes to an Icelandic nurse, Miss Sigridur Gudmundsdottir, of Reykjavik. The American nominee is Miss Cecilia E. Walsh, who has been a nursing field representative for the American Red Cross in New England since 1937. Miss Gudmundsdottir received early nursing training in Denmark and England.
