A Holiday Home for Working Women.

Queen Mary will on March 31st open the new Mary Macarthur Holiday Home for Working Women at Stansted, Essex. It replaces the original home founded at Ongar, Essex, in memory of Mary Macarthur in 1922, and will provide considerably more accommodation.

Mary Macarthur, who died in 1921 at the age of 42, is remembered by countless working women with affection and gratitude. She rendered valuable service to the country on many Government committees during the Great War.

Since the founding of the Ongar home 6,500 women have spent a holiday there. It has now become imperative to increase the accommodation.

The cost involved in acquiring, equipping and taking over the new premises is approximately £10,000.

Honour Paid to War Graves.

It is revealed in the annual report of the Imperial War Graves Commission, which is to be published at once that during the crisis which preceded the Munich agreement, arrangements were made between the Commission and the German War Graves Service by which each would ensure the maintenance of the German and British graves in their

respective territories in the event of hostilities.

The Commission notes, "with the deepest appreciation," the respect and honour paid to British cemeteries in Germany by the German people, both officially and

privately.
