(3) Course in special work and Nursing Education.

The Eire Committee of the Florence Nightingale Memorial organised a Fete, which was held in the Mansion

House, Dublin, during May, 1938, and part of the proceeds were earmarked for providing this Scholarship which is valued at £250.

Much interest is taken in Nurses and Nursing nowadays by all sections of the public Press, there-fore it is well to give publicity to this endeavour to obtain for Nurses in Ireland the very best Post-Graduate Courses, which are so greatly appreciated by responsible people throughout the world.

THE DEAR ANIMALS.

The People's Dispensary for Sick Animals of the Poor. The society affectionately known as "The P.D.S.A.,"

treated nearly one million cases of sick animals last year, at home and abroad.

This most humane society has at its disposal 66 dispensaries, 7 caravan dispensaries, 4 ambulances and 5 hospitals working among the animals of the poor. It is the friend of costers, hawkers and all poor men, treating their horses and donkeys when sick and injured. As their animals are the breadwinners, it prevents their owners joining the ranks of the unemployed. It prevents untold suffering through neglect and ignorance. Children who visit the dispensaries

are taught their re-sponsibilities towards their pets.
