But again we ask who placed Red Cross workers under German control?



This reminds us that so long as the London County Council compels its British Nursing Staff to submit to the control of a naturalised alien Matron, it cannot consistently

exclude alien probationers. Moreover, we call upon the L.C.C. to make it known to applicants for training that they will be placed under the orders of a Matron who is not British born. No doubt this fact would deter patriotic girls from placing themselves in an invidious position during this death struggle with foreign powers. Anyway it is not fair to leave them in ignorance; the position should be made clear in advertisements
