It was agreed that the names of 3,473 nurses who have not paid their retention fee for 1939 be removed from the Register, in accordance with the Rules, Part II, Paragraph 5 (3).

It was pointed out by the Chairman that, as only two Examinations had been completed during the year, the number of nurses registered by Examination might appear to be less than the number reported for the previous year. The actual number of names on the Register at January 1st, 1940, was: General Part of the Register, 77,739; Supplementary Part of the Register for Male Nurses, 363; for Mental Nurses, 4,771; for Nurses for Mental Defectives, 249; for Sick Children's Nurses, 2,858; and for Fever Nurses, 7,504.

Education and Examination.

The recommendations of the Education and Examination Committee were approved.

Disciplinary Cases.

The following case was placed before the Council:—
Miss Doris Hinds, S.R.N. 64847, was reported in
December, 1939, for immoral conduct with a Mr. Clayton,
in 1935, he being married.

The case was notified by Mrs. Clayton, who, during the intervening years, had obtained sums of money from Miss Hinds, on a threat of the matter being reported.

Mr. Collingwood gave extensive evidence for Miss Hinds,

and Mrs. Clayton also appeared.

The matter was considered in camera by the Council, and the Chairman, in declaring their verdict, said that, under the circumstances, the Council had decided to dismiss the case with a caution, but the facts proved against Miss Hinds constituted misconduct, and the fault was a very serious one.

The next case was that of Miss Eileen McAloon, S.R.N. 71463, judgment of which was postponed from January, 1939, when she had been found guilty of larceny.

The Council decided not to strike Miss McAloon's name from the Register of Nurses.

SHORT STATEMENT BY THE CHAIRMAN.

This being the first meeting of the full Council since the outbreak of War, the Chairman presented a short statement as to the business which had been carried out during the last $4\frac{1}{2}$ months.

The State Examinations due to take place in October were cancelled; owing to the movement of probationers and of examiners and the great difficulty of obtaining halls and other accommodation it would have been impossible to hold the Examinations at the usual time. Examinations were carried out in November-December. Owing to the amount of work involved, due to the increase in the number of Centres, it was not possible to arrange the Practical Final Examination for London candidates until January.

Owing to this postponement, it will not be possible to hold Examinations in February this year; the next will

take place April-May.

It will be necessary shortly to consider what steps must be taken to meet the expenses arising out of the forthcoming Examinations. The rapid rise in the prices of materials, particularly paper, is causing an increase in expenditure, but it has been possible to effect certain economies in other directions, and, owing to the kind assistance and co-operation of the Hospital Authorities in providing accommodation for the Examinations and the services of assistants free of cost, or at nominal charges only, it was possible to keep down the expense of the last Examination.

The Register will be printed this year as usual, but owing to the shortage of staff, and to the reduction of hours owing to the blackout, it will not be published as early as usual.
