knowledge in the teaching departments.

The American Women's Hospitals have done great work in Greece, and the little pamphlet sent to us illustrates how wide now, in Greece, are the various activities not only for specialising in nursing work, but for promoting the health of the people in every possible way. "Of all peoples," it has been said, "the Greeks have dreamed of life the best." Certainly this is so of their ideal of the perfection to which the human body should attain and of the prowess which it should develop.

Recruits for Overseas.

We learn that:

"In these days when there are so many calls and claims for national service, we need to remember that other call for service in missionary work overseas. There is no less suffering and sickness in Africa and the East because there is a war in Europe; there are hospitals in desperate need of helpers; many missionary sisters are working in terribly understaffed posts. Do any of our members, even in these

days, hear the call of God to this work?

One Missionary Society Secretary writes of 13 vacant posts (three in Africa, one in Palestine, two in Iran, three in India, and four in China) and adds "this list is a relatively short one and would be much longer if (financially) we could tackle the real needs of the work." Another writes: "We are in urgent need of offers of service from nurses holding the State Certificates for both general nursing and midwifery, and who have had experience in posts of responsibility. There are vacancies in China, India and

Africa which must be filled as soon as possible."

From a third we hear that "Recruits ARE wanted, and our policy is 'Go forward in faith.' Enquiries from nurses are welcome, and the Candidates Secretary is glad to arrange talks with possible candidates at any stage of training. Eastern nurses still need the help of their Western victors!"

## THE GENERAL NURSING COUNCIL FOR ENGLAND AND WALES.

A meeting of the General Nursing Council for England and Wales was held at the Offices of the Council, 23, Portland Place, London, W., on March 29th. Dame Ellen Musson, D.B.E., R.R.C., LL.D., presided.

Congratulations were accorded Miss Z. L. Puxley upon

her appointment as Assistant Secretary (Acting) at the Ministry of Health, being the first woman to attain such a position. Miss Puxley thanked the Council for their good wishes.

Finance.

On the recommendation of the Finance Committee, bills and claims submitted for payment were approved, and the sums of £510 for weekly salaries, £200 for postage stamps, £35 for insurance stamps and £15 for petty cash were allowed.

Various estimates for stationery were accepted.

It was agreed that, in accordance with the Council's Solicitor, no steps be taken at the present time in relation to the Government Compensation Scheme in case of War

damage to property.

Sir Henry Gooch asked if there were copies of all important documents lodged in some quite safe place, in case the worst happened and the building were burnt to the ground. He was informed that important documents were in the strong room, and the Architect had a copy of the plans of the building.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee agreed to

look into this matter.

Registration.

It was reported that copies of the Register of Nurses had been received from the Joint Nursing and Midwives Council for Northern Ireland; the Medical Council of Southern Rhodesia; the Nurses' Registration Board of the Australian Capital Territory (Canberra); and from the Bengal Nursing Council.

It was reported that a copy of the amendments to the Regulations had been received from the Nurses' Board of

Victoria, Australia.

Applications for approval for Registration were: General Register, by reciprocity, 14; Supplementary Part of the Register for Mental Nurses, by reciprocity, 1; for Sick Children's Nurses, by reciprocity, 1; for Fever Nurses, by Examination, 7, by reciprocity, 3. Total 26.

It was agreed that 282 nurses who had hitherto failed to pay their retention fee, and now wished their names re-

included in the Register, should be reincluded.

## Education and Examination.

On the recommendation of the Education and Examination Committee it was agreed provisional approval be extended for a further period of one year to two hospitals; and provisional approval of schemes of affiliation be extended for a further period of one year to several institutions.

An interview was reported with representatives of the Board of Education to discuss the qualifications of teachers of the professional subjects in the Pre-Nursing Courses for Part I of the Preliminary Examination. It was agreed that as a temporary measure, for the duration of the War only, a degree course in Biology or Zoology be accepted as sufficient qualification for teachers in Anatomy and Physiology in the Pre-Nursing Courses.

The Board of Education recommended the approval of the following schools for the one-year whole time course of instruction for the purposes of Part I of the Preliminary

Examination:

Southampton Council Grammar School for Girls; Lilley and Stone's Girls' School, Newark; Tonypandy Secondary

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
